The sailing season is upon us again and its time to ready your boat for the coming summer.

Work over winter has seen us commence the building of new club pontoons. Ross Edmunds of Confab Bell Bay has been working with his team to build the three aluminium frames at no cost to the club apart from the purchase of materials. The

aluminium frames should be a longer lasting material than the current galvanised steel. We are reusing the floats from the old pontoons after pressure testing them and they will have the same decking as the new jetty and fuel berth. We expect a have the outer pontoon in place shortly with the other two pontoons to be complete before Christmas.

On the subject of the pontoons we have been fortunate to receive sponsorship from QUBE at Bell Bay toward the costs and we are most grateful to them for their help. We are also endeavouring to obtain grant funds through Rene Hidding and are awaiting a decision in this regard. We have a shortfall of some \$10,000 to \$15,000.

We have been fortunate in securing sponsorship from CNW Electrical Wholesale to enable us to purchase a solar panel system at cost and for Tas Electrical Services to install it at no cost. This will greatly assist with our power bill In other news we have recently undertaken an audit of all of the cradles on our slipway and identified their various capacities, beams and designs to assist firstly Leigh our Boson to quickly determine if a suitable cradle is available for your vessel to come up and secondly to clarify what maintenance work is required to keep the cradles in a usable condition. Again Ross Edmunds and others will be involved to undertake this work at little cost to the club. As I mentioned in my report for the AGM we are intending to formulate a "five-year plan" to prioritise the capital works program and we would appreciate your input to enable us to develop infrastructure our members most desire. Suggestions as to how the various ideas can be funded would also be appreciated. Please send me an email or phone with your ideas.

Finally, we are having our usual pre-opening day working bee on Saturday 6th October. I look forward to seeing you all then.

Trailer Park Members

The trailer park is cut during working bees and we try to mow under boats then if we are able to. We can't move boats that have flat tires or locked tow hitches. So if your boat falls into either of these categories, you have a couple of options:

- 1. Leave a key with Dave Blazley.
- 2. Mow it yourself. The club has a couple of mowers so you won't have to bring one from home.

If we can't get under the boat you may be billed.

Having the trailer park looking neat reflects well on the whole club and avoids damage to the mowers from hitting objects obscured in the long grass.

Moorings

Members who would like to have a mooring position in the PDYC controlled area should apply, in writing, to the committee and a position will be allocated to them by our mooring officer Glen Cornish Mobile 0419305490 if available.

The position only, is allocated, with the mooring tackle the responsibility of the member.

Current mooring owners within the PDYC controlled area are reminded that in the event of resignation from the Club or vacating the mooring site, the tackle only may be sold, with the mooring **site** reverting back to the club for re-allocation. The tackle should be removed within 14 days, unless otherwise arranged with the mooring officer, before your resignation will be accepted.

It is timely to remind members about use of the club's Courtesy dinghy. The dinghy is provided for member's use to retrieve and put boats back on their moorings, and **use should be limited to a maximum of 15 minutes only.**


It is not acceptable for members to take the dinghy out to their moored boats and keep it there for extended periods of time while maintenance or other work is carried out. If such work is required, then bring your boat back to the pontoon or use your own dinghy.

Extended periods of use can inconvenience other members who have every right to expect that the dinghy will become available for their use after a short period of time.

It is also appropriate to remind members of the safety regulations for the use of the Courtesy dinghy.

All people in the Courtesy dinghy MUST WEAR PFDs at all times.

Unless these safety rules are complied with the Committee will have to consider withdrawing the Courtesy dinghy facility in order to reduce the risk to the club operations. Your co-operation would be appreciated.

THE "CLASSIC" SAILING LEG START AT ROSEVEARS

It seems that almost everyone has a Classic story to tell. It is just one of those iconic events that keeps coming back in one form or another.

The common theme over the years is a river race with a multi discipline relay of sorts with a good time from beginning to end. 2018 sees the Classic evolve yet again.



The Saturday NOV 17 race will be a morning start near to the Rosevears Tavern. Racing kayaks or canoes (one per team) will mass start to race through to a leg finish line at or about the Gravelly beach boat ramp. After sufficient buffer, team sailboats will mass start at Rosevears and race to the North.

Teams will sail to a line at Gravely Beach, where race clocks stopped, the team runner will get off to start the 13km road race to the Sidmouth Boat ramp.

Kayakers will board their team sailboat for a sailboat restart heading north.

Sailboats will race down river, under the Batman bridge to cross a leg finish line near Sidmouth.

Race clocks again stopped, team runners are ferried back aboard team sailboats, the sail race recommences, with boats sailing north through Long Reach on to the PDYC race finish line, Beauty Point.

Dinner, refreshments, prize presentations and entertainment will follow at the PDYC club rooms.

Each yacht must carry a minimum of 3 crew of which one is a runner and one is a canoeist.

Robbie Hiroshima ready





With 35 liberties competing at the international and worlds, there will be some good competition from other sailors that race them a lot more than me, more so fighting for the best spot on the start line to get the best start,





Sailing with advantage




Mechanical advantage is embedded in every action in every sailboat. Understanding the mostly simple principles that guide these advantages can give you an edge. Sailing as we know it would not be possible without cranks, levers, drums, gears, screws, blocks and tackle.

Over the next few issues we will take a look at these tools, their principles and how they work on a sailboat. (Warning there may be maths involved) The ideal lever does not dissipate or store energy, which means there is no friction in the hinge or bending in the beam. In this case, the power into the lever equals the power out, and the ratio of output to input force is given by the ratio of the distances from the fulcrum to the points of application of these forces. This is known as the law of the lever.

We are surrounded by levers in every day life but they may be a little harder to spot on a dingy.



The forestay may be levered into tension as you are setting up, far more tension than you could add without mechanical advantage. Next time you have your boat out look for the levers that help you carry the load.
